With no place for prep, scarce storage, and a lack of gathering spaces, this suburban Chicago kitchen needed a fresh start, and it needed to be respectful of the existing architecture. Here's how kitchen designer Rebekah Zaveloff approached the design problems.

The Wish List

"The client had a few things on her wish list for this kitchen. The first was an informal area. The other request was desk space for her two kids, which was quite a feat to accomplish considering the size of the kitchen and all the other things we needed to have in there."

Inspiration

"The architectural bones of the kitchen were inspired by the front foyer of the house, which had a very classic, soft, and elegant feel without being too formal. We tried to repeat the molding, the panel work from the stairs, and some of the details. And the colors were gorgeous together-soft whites and grays, dark wood, and a chandelier. Those were some of our inspiration points."

The Vision

"The overall design vision was that the kitchen should look like it had always been there. The house has an old soul, so we took great pains to include items that felt like they were timeworn. We included vintage pieces, used materials that we knew would patina easily, and did a soft burnished glaze on the cabinet colors."

Smart Storage

"I usually go with tried-and-true when it comes to storage solutions. I think about the things we have, the way we like to cook, the way we entertain, and how frustrating it is when you can't find things when you go looking for them. The built-in hutch that's to your left when you're at the island sink has everything from pots and pans below to napkin rings and candles in the middle to dishes and glassware above. It helps contribute to a sort of European aesthetic, which means fewer wall cabinets and more windows and continuous tile. It helps the space feel lighter."

Casual Choices

"One of the things we decided early on was to go with carrara marble countertops as opposed to Calcutta. We also chose to go with machinemade subway tiles as opposed to handmade. Those decisions actually contributed to making the kitchen feel more casual and approachable, rather than formal and overly elegant. It definitely helps contribute to the space feeling more comfortable, and it suits the family's lifestyle."
